

# Mud Painting

## Best for Ages

2+

## Workspace

Flat indoor/outdoor surface

## Is electricity required?

## Description

This is painting with a natural twist-dirt! Use mud and other natural materials to create unique paintings that are full of sensory opportunities.

## Materials

- Dirt
- Spoon for mixing
- Bowls or cups
- Water
- Paintbrushes
- Fun embellishments: make homemade paint brushes using pine needles; paint with nature by using leaves, twigs, flowers, etc. instead of paintbrushes
- Optional: paper, food coloring, watercolors

## Concepts Explored

- Fine Motor Skills
- Nature
- Creativity

## What to Do

1. Scoop some dirt into a cup or bowl. Begin slowly adding water while stirring with the spoon.
2. Add dirt and/or water to reach your desired consistency of paint. How does adding more or less dirt affect the color of the paint?
3. When you have the desired consistency of your paint, you can add water colors or food coloring for more color options. Use with caution as these may stain surfaces.
4. Prepare an extra cup of water to rinse off your paint brushes.
5. If you do not have paint brushes, try using natural materials such as leaves or flowers.
6. Dip the paintbrush into the mud paint and begin painting. You can paint on rocks, concrete, paper, or cardboard.
7. Does the paint look different on different surfaces? What happens when the paint dries?



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## Troubleshooting Tips

- If your paint is too thin, add more dirt. If your paint is too thick, add more water.
- If mud painting inside, put trash bags or newspaper under your workspace for quick clean up.
- This activity can be messy! You can make an apron using a trash bag to keep mud off your clothes.



Does all mud look the same? Is it the same color or consistency?

Does mud act the same as paint on paper? What about other surfaces?

What happens if you leave the mud to dry in the sun?

## What is Happening?

- This activity helps to develop **fine motor skills** which is the coordination of small muscles in your wrist and hands. These small muscles are the same muscles we use for writing and drawing. Early learners are developing fine motor skills as they grasp the paint brush or use their hands to explore the texture of the mud.
- This is a great activity that ties **nature** and **creativity** together. Take this opportunity to see what you can find outside to use during your painting experience.
