Description

Explore the great outdoors! Head outside to discover your backyard, garden or porch - you never know what you may find in the most familiar places!

Materials

- Shoes
- Sunscreen
- Camera (optional)
- Paper and Writing/Drawing Utensil

What to Do

- Put on your shoes and sunscreen. Grab your paper and writing utensil. Now step outside into your outdoor area.
- Take a look around the space and describe what you see. Use descriptive words to illustrate what you are noticing.
- Explore the space more closely and take time to wander at your own pace.
- 4. Ask more questions like, "What do you see in the backyard that you haven't seen before?" and "Can you spot any plants or animals?".
- 5. Take it a step further by collecting natural materials and take photographs of the area. Only collect materials if you have adult permission and it's not a dangerous plant like poison ivy!
- Journal about your discoveries. Sketches are a great way to capture what you saw on your nature walk.

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Troubleshooting Tips

- Is it raining or cold outside? Bundle up or use an umbrella before heading outdoors.
- Don't have a backyard? Use whatever outdoor space you have available, whether it's outside your apartment or the park across the street.
- If you don't see any animals or plants right away, look closer and listen carefully, you never know what you may find!

What is Happening?

- Wildlife is all around us even when we don't see it at first. Animals and plants are important parts of our day-to-day lives and knowing the different types is a useful skill. Try collecting different types of plants from your backyard and documenting it in your journal.
- Outdoor discovery is not only fun, but educational as well. Nature surrounds us and we can use our observational skills to notice things we haven't before. Different types of ecosystems are everywhere. After exploring, take time to research the plants and animals you discovered to learn about the fascinating things you found outdoors.
